We must be careful not to do to AI for e-discovery what happened with TAR. All studies show TAR is at least as good if not far superior to keywords and manual review. But many lawyers and clients do not use TAR because of the concern that discovery motion practice, and complicated validation measures, will take away the cost savings from use of Tar. So at most they use TAR for prioritization of review behind the firewall, so to speak. Perhaps lawyers and clients who don't want to be early adopters of AI for e-discovery will be late adopters of TAR?
